- To feel equipped to help your child in making these decisions.


How do students start to make the choice?

Student's options/choices do depend on the <u>results</u> they achieve in their GCSE's.

- 5 or more GCSE's at 9-4 will enable students to move into most Level 3 qualifications (*A 'levels, L3 vocational courses, advanced apprenticeships*)
- Students with lower results will be able to move into Level 2 or 1 qualifications (vocational courses, intermediate apprenticeships, traineeships etc)

Students will also consider the <u>type of place</u> they wish to study: **college**, a **sixth form** or **on the job** (an apprenticeship, T levels)

Choices available based on GCSE results



What and where to study?

3 key choices of where to study

- Further Education (College)
- 2. Sixth Form
- 3. Apprenticeships and Training

What and where to study?

Sixth Form

These are usually based at a school.

Mostly offer A 'level courses (Level 3 qualifications)

Entry requirements are usually grade 6 for the subject you wish to study (plus English and Maths at grade 5 – check the entry requirements at place of study).

Apprenticeships

On the job training

College

Derby, Burton and South East Derbyshire college, Chesterfield, New college Nottingham, Confetti etc

Can offer A levels

i.e. Joseph Wright Centre at Derby College

Offer vocational courses

i.e. The Roundhouse at Derby College (BTec, NVQ, Diplomas, T-levels)

Courses such as Bricklaying, Construction, Hair and Beauty, Motor Vehicle Maintenance, Health and Social Care

A Level courses are a level 3 (same entry as for sixth form)

Vocational courses can be at a level 1, 2 or 3

Depends on entry requirements – check with the place of study

What is the best place to study?


This depends on what the student wants to study and the type of learning they wish to undertake.

- A levels are highly academic with the highest entry requirements. You can study at a school or college environment. Both places of study require a high level of study and commitment and have exams at the end of the 2 year course.
- Vocational courses can be more practical in nature and sometimes have a work based placement included (i.e. Childcare, Health and Social Care). Assessment is done on a continuous basis with coursework and end of unit assessments. These courses are usually only offered at college due to the specialist facilities needed.
- Apprenticeships can often be the hardest option. Students will need to work (usually for 4 days a week) and then attend a college or training provider once a week to complete the theory and written aspects of the course. Assignments will be set and assessments are usually on a continuous basis.

College – No specific deadline at most places Apprenticeships - as advertised

All students should make full time education applications (even if apprenticeships are their first choice).


Students provide grades achieved in their Year 10 report

Apprenticeships offer a great alternative to full time higher education, allowing you to learn a trade whilst earning money.





The Guidance Process at Littleover

What each student receives in and out of lessons?

- Careers lessons (Y10 students had approx. 20 hours and Y11 Autumn term focus).
- Careers Library open Tues and Weds lunchtime for students to get help and advice
- Opportunity for 1 to 1 Careers guidance Interviews
- Unifrog Careers platform (Key documents such as CVs, Personal Statements)
- Interview skills and preparation (Mock Interviews week beginning 21st
 November)
- Application help and practise

What to do next

- Talk to your child about what they want to do
- Encourage your child to attend Open Evenings
- Encourage your child to seek help in school if needed
- Support them in making their decision
- Ensure that they have a back up plan
- Ask us if you need any further help or advice.

What is the Post 16 Bursary and why should students apply?

- The Post 16 Bursary provides financial assistance to help students carry on learning next year and the year after that.
- The funds should be used to support studies (e.g. buying course materials, transport to and from school/college, fieldwork and trips).

How much should students get?

- It depends how many people in each year are eligible. Each sixth form has a set amount of money to divide equally among those who qualify.
- Most providers will use the fund to purchase supplies, resources, bus passes etc. directly for students rather than giving the students money.

Who Is Eligible to apply?

Age

• Students need to be 16, 17 or 18 and have left – or be about to leave – compulsory education.

Course

Students need to be enrolled on a course in England which is one of the following:

- a full-time further education course at a college or school
- a Diploma or a course that leads to an Apprenticeship
- Basically any student who continues in full time education or training with a recognised provider.

Household Income

- Taxable household income below approx. £20,000 - £25,000 (varies slightly from place to place)
- If the student has a part-time job any money they earn isn't included in your overall household income.

Other Criteria

If the young person is.....

- In care or a care leaver
- Receiving income support
- Disabled and in receipt of Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance

All the above qualify for £1200 a year

How to apply?

- All applications are processed by the provider (i.e. school sixth form, college etc)
- Check with individual providers when they would like applications submitted
- Most will be the end of September
- Documentary evidence of income etc. will be required with the application.
- Students will need their own bank account.

Things to remember

- Ask your post 16 provider for a copy of their policy and application form if you believe you may qualify.
- Make sure the students have their own bank accounts when they start their post 16 studies.
- Make sure you have appropriate documentary evidence of your income etc.
